## Wrens and Kingfishers

Festive spirits have been high this week with a lot of excited and bubbly children. Santa's workshop was very busy on Monday morning, the children used the class lists to ask what others wanted for Christmas and independently organised an assembly line. Some were using tools to make the presents,

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others wrapping and the final stage was to place the presents in Jaxon's stocking to deliver to the sleeping children in the story corner. The Wrens and Kingfishers worked brilliantly together to create this scene. Both classes read two versions of 'The Elves and The Shoe Makers', discussed the differences in the stories and designed an ideal shoe. The children came up with describing words for the shoe and had a go at segmenting and writing some of these words themselves.

We have talked a lot about giving to others at this time of year and that not all people are as fortunate as us. The Kingfishers watched a previous John Lewis advert about giving love and constructed a letter to Santa asking for him to bring love, friendship and food to others. We were looking at using the 'To' and 'From' within the structure of a letter and will continue to model this at the writing table. Mrs Denly has worked hard to sort the garden into zones of play. The children have been enjoying

expressing themselves whilst playing the musical instruments and many of the Wrens have learnt to ride the trikes. Next week we will be exploring the story of The Nativity and The Nutcracker as well as making many Christmas decorations. On Tuesday we will celebrate Saint Nicholas day, sharing handmade gifts with each other and finding out who Saint Nicholas was.

#### <u>Robins</u>

This week a high five jointly goes to the narrators in the nativity play (Daisy, Roman, Oscar, Beatrice and Lucah), for working so hard on their voice projection and for organising themselves so well. We've not had Mrs Birch in this week to help with the practices and they have been superstars at knowing when to come on and off and organising themselves!

We have spent a good amount of time rehearsing our show to make it as polished as possible for our audiences. Lots of effort has gone into speaking and singing clearly and I am really impressed with their efforts. They have loved learning the dance and are very keen to share it with everyone next week. In English, we have been working on our setting descriptions of the London Underground, describing the sights and sounds underground. In history, we have been increasing our understanding of what an eye witness is and learning more about London Underground campaigner Charles Pearson.

We have continued our work on addition in maths, with the Year 1s working on how many different ways we can partition to add 5 and 6 and Year 2s working on adding different amounts to 2 digit numbers. They have been focussing really well and I am particularly impressed with the Year 2s who are really good at assessing how confident they feel.

## Owls

This week in Owls, we looked at what it is to be an outside. The children had the task of creating a comic strip based on a scenario of somebody feeling like an outside. This was to make the children aware of how it feels to be an outsider and how somebody may feel in daily situations. The children contributed lots of ideas and this linked well with our lesson on being a bystander and what we can do if someone feels isolated.

In English, with Mr Ballard the children were acting as detective in their reading lesson. They were tasked to make a 10-step plan on how Charlotte would stop Wilbur from being killed. The children really used their imaginations in this and came up with lots of wild solutions, taking their knowledge of other story plots and applying this to their writing. In our English writing lessons, we have been focusing on our non-fiction text of 'Wild Child'. The children wrote their own introductions to entice the reader to explore their non-fictions texts. This is based on school's garden and the children have lots of fantastic ideas for chapters.

In Science we began our topic on light. We discussed natural and artificial sources of light and how these are used. In our whole class discussion, we focused on what a reflector is and how we see these every day. The

class had lots of knowledge on the changing of the seasons and how the sun affects the earth with temperature. Looking at how the sun lights up the moon and how it rotates. Owl class began to make the connections with our last topic and how light can be described as electromagnetic radiation.

# Red Kites

On Wednesday afternoon we began our research into the tomb of Lady Fu Hao. One of King Wu Ding's 64 wives, she was a high priestess and military leader. The discovery of her tomb in the 1970s has been likened to the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb as it was one which had lain undisturbed for thousands of years.

Using a range of sources, the children have been gathering information to present their learning in way which they feel will engage their reader. So far, we have brightly coloured double page spreads, power points, lift-the-flap pages, interactive diagrams and cutaway drawings. We will be sure to share photographs when they are complete.

We have also been working hard on our use of cohesive devices in English. We have talked about how texts which flow are easier to read and more engaging too. Using a scene from the film and book where Howl despairs over accidentally changing the colour of his hair, we have practiced not only what we have learned about cohesive texts, but also how we can use synonyms to accentuate a particular feature. In this case the grimness of the gloop Howl produces.

Year 5 have completed a maths test this week to help us all to see which elements of their learning they have secured so far this year. They all set about this with a very positive attitude. We have also begun to use a web-based app called LBQ (learning by questions) to revisit and secure our learning.
