What's been going on around the School this week

Kingfishers and Wrens

This week we have focused on the story of Christmas. We noticed that whilst learning the words and songs for our nativity, the children didn't know who a lot of the characters were, such as the shepherds. We enjoyed reading the story, acting it out and even watching the older children perform their nativity (which all the Kingfishers thought was brilliant!). I observed a group of boys using small world nativity characters to dance to their singing of George Ezra, a modern take of the nativity. Just a reminder that our short performance is on Tuesday at 2:30 in the Burrows.

Saint Nicholas day sparked many interesting conversations after sharing simple facts about who he was and why we celebrate him. They made little gifts for each other to spread the kindness that we had learnt about.

The Burrows have gone glitter mad this week, adding it to the playdough, craft and the children seem to be covered in it. There have also been some fantastic examples of the children's mark making and writing. The Wrens have been asking others what they would like to Christmas and marking the responses on paper and the Kingfishers have put thought into their writing, considering what the initial sound of the word is and segmenting the word. As the last week approaches before Christmas, we will be recapping the letters and numbers that we have learnt so far (both the Wrens and Kingfishers).

The children have been noticing the changes in the weather and one boy came in excited to tell his friends that Jack Frost has been, which was very sweet and has inspired us to add this story for next week's key text and explore the winter weather. With the temperature dropping so much, please may all children have warm coats, hats etc. as they are still keen to get out.

Robins

This week, Robin Class have been finalising preparations for Wriggly Nativity and have put on three brilliant performances. Each and every child has joined in and tried so hard and it has been wonderful to see their confidence grow across the term. Well done Robin Class!

Alongside this, the children have been learning about the illustrator Carol Barker and her fabulously coloured London Underground posters, aimed at encouraging families to visit London and use the Underground. They really enjoyed using oil pastels to experiments

with the shapes and colours she used and next week will be exploring using wax resist techniques to explore her work further.

In English and geography, we have been looking at a map of London, learning about some London Landmarks and thinking about which ones we would like to visit if we went to London. The most popular ones were the London Eye (although there was a bit of concern about how high it would feel at the top), the Tower of London, Tower Bridge and the Natural History museum (there were lots of children who wanted to see the dinosaur skeletons). The children were also keen to see the Paddington statue on Platform 1 at Paddington Station.



In maths, we have continued to work on their addition skills and Year 2 have been working really hard to get to a place of confidence adding two digit numbers together. We will continue this next week.

Owls

This week in Owls we celebrating St Nicholas day! The children created fact files on St Nicholas and thought about how kind and caring he was. We looked at lots of stories centered around St Nicholas and the children were amazed at how much they learnt! We then focused on a video by an artist who did an incredibly detailed sketch on St Nicholas. As a class we drew together, focusing on the tiny details of a portrait.

This week we used the chrome books to focus on computer programming. The children had to independently pick their own backgrounds and characters. Once they had done this using the

programme 'Purple Mash', they were given the task of editing these by adding audio to their characters. This

was a very new experience for them and they were resilient in their approach, having to practice several times to gain confidence.

We have had lots of Owls helping in the garden at lunchtimes, clearing the garden and tidying up. This has been amazing as it will allow for everyone to enjoy the garden and grow new produce in the upcoming year. Owls also loved watching the nativity and were discussing how amazing it was – Well done Robins!





Red Kites

This week we have been working on our DT projects- prototype Christmas toys which move using pneumatics. I have been amazed by the variety of designs that groups have come up with. Checking against the design criteria, they are working hard on making sure

that their designs have a high-quality finish, as well as checking that they operate smoothly.

In English, we have spent time planning a fantasy story, either using a video we have watched or our own ideas. There are a range stories on the horizon, including lots involving Pokémon!

Year 6 have reached the end of their unit on the Order of Operations, and have all worked really hard to understand how each element of a mixed calculation is handled. Their next step is to look at some multi-step problems and write the calculations which match. Year 5 have a few more steps in their addition and subtraction unit left, but they have managed the challenge of adding decimal numbers with different numbers of decimals well. Once we have looked at how to subtract mixed decimals, they will also be applying their understanding to multi-step problems.

Finally, we have had fun playing the categories game just before lunch so I am planning to spend my weekend trying to work out which challenging categories to include next week. A car beginning with an 'i' left us all rather stumped on Thursday...
