

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
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Kingfishers

In Kingfishers we have been focussing on getting to know our classmates and adults; exploring our new space and the resources available; learning the rules and routines; and sharing lots of stories. We learnt about the school rule "Be Kind" by reading the book "Have you Filled a Bucket today?" We are making a kindness chain where each link in a paper chain represents an act of kindness spotted in our classroom. We learnt about the school rule "Be the



Best You Can Be" by reading Splash by paralympic gold medallist Claire Cashmore.

We have been doing lots of singing and the children have learnt a song to support handwashing. You might like to ask your child if they can sing it to you. In maths we have been focussing on counting and numbers to five including singing number songs.

In art, we have been learning about primary colours and what other colours can be made from them, whilst in science we thought about what animals, including human, need to survive.

Owls

This week in Owls, we have been reading our new class book Arthur and the Golden Rope. The children have enjoyed this and we have been thinking about what heroes look like to us. The children loved creating their own super heroes and had some incredible language to add to our working wall, using Thesaurus' to up level their adjectives. We have also been looking at what Arthur packed for his adventure into his bag. We all came up with items that were essential for our adventures and it was interesting to see how many chose pets over water! In Science we have been learning about forces. Focusing on pulling and pushing. The children have been fantastic at categorizing forces and understanding the effects of friction. They have a clear understanding of our key vocabulary and are confident in their approach to the tasks. I am really impressed with their scientific knowledge and their eagerness to learn.





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In History we began our topic on the Anglo-Saxons. When given the challenge of creating ships for the Anglo-Saxons to arrive in, it was beyond impressive when they created ores and benches out of sticks and cardboard. They worked well as part of a team and were very inventive in their designs. When evaluating their boats, it was lovely to see how many children had commented on how well their team worked together and were reflective in how their designs matched up to their final creation.

Ms Palmer and myself have really enjoyed how passionate the children have been about their learning and how many new friendships have formed from a new class. Well done Owls! Ms Batty

Red Kites

At the end of last week, we wrote up the story of 'The Dragon Pearl'. This is a traditional Chinese tale which focuses on service to others. This week we have looked at the central plot of the story in order to establish what we can change without changing the plot. In the original story, the protagonist meets three animals who ask for his help. Each then gives him a gift which will help him in his quest. We had fun thinking about which animals the protagonists in our own stories might meet and the gifts that they might give. I am looking forward to reading the final outcomes next week.

Both Year 5 and 6 have made an excellent start to their maths this term. I have been pleased with the general determination to improve and be the best that they can be. Both Mrs Ambrose and I were particularly delighted by the positive approach shown by the children who joined us for some extra maths work this week.

We have also made a start on our project this term which looks at the importance of the Shang Dynasty. So far we have learned that it was a Bronze Age Civilisation which grew up along the Yellow River in a similar way to Early Egyptian settlements along the Nile. We have also heard the Story of Yellow Dragon and Black Turtle and considered which aspects of the story might be true. In Science we have found out how we see and have created mono-chrome optic art.
